





RESTORING HIST©RY

Your support of the Restoring Hope campaign will enable it to shine once again as a jewel in North St. Louis.

Nostalgically known as the Old Sears Building, the massive 205,000-square foot facility on North Kingshighway has long been integral to the social and commercial lives of the African American community. Built in 1928, Sears was the only major department store accessible to the increasing concentration of African Americans in North St. Louis.

The new facility will consolidate programs that stabilize our neediest families, including utility assistance, foreclosure prevention, and food and clothing pantries. Currently, our 55+ programs are spread across 20 locations, creating a barrier for our most vulnerable populations.

Sears sold the building to local African American brothers Steven and Michael Roberts who breathed new life into the property, which they renamed the Victor Roberts Building in honor of their father. Over the next four decades, they leased space to nonprofit, government, and business entities, providing some stability to the area. Children looked forward to the peanuts and jellybeans on the first floor, teenagers obtained their driver's license at the Missouri driver's license office-a true rite of passage, and parents ran errands and shopped for affordable clothing,appliances and household goods.

When the time came for the Roberts brothers to transition ownership, the opportunity of a lifetime became clear: the Urban League would purchase the Victor Roberts Building for its new headquarters. Though the iconic building has lost some of its luster, its physical status in the black community remains strong.

ANTICIPATED OUTCOMES

Regional Headquarters/Community Empowerment Center

INCREASE CLIENTS SERVED FROM 100,000 TO 125,000 ANNUALLY

- O1 Consolidated offices allow for better speed and efficiency processing safety-net programs (utility/rental assistance and weatherization)
- O2 Easy access to public transportation creates greater accessibility for more clients, volunteers and supporters
- Improved technology reduces administrative bottlenecks; increases clients served
- O4 Office layout improves collaboration around data collection/analysis creating stronger funding opportunities


EXPAND PROGRAMS & DIRECT SERVICES

- O1 Gain site control of bordering Aubert Plaza and parking lot
- O2 Create Business Incubator in Plaza (providing direct and in-direct programs and services)
- O3 Utilize campus for large-scale public support initiatives (holiday food distributions, emergency relief operations, wellness events)
- O4 Evaluate/re-purpose existing space in 1408 Headquarters

RECAPTURE REVENUE FOR PROGRAMS/SERVICES

- O1 Lower overhead expenses (building maintenance for multiple facilities, utility costs)
- O2 Reduce redundancy in procurement and office administration
- O3 Generate operating income from leasing opportunities in the Aubert Plaza
- O4 Generate revenue from naming opportunities in headquarters building/campus

RESTORING COMMUNITY

Creating a one-stop community resource in the heart of North St. Louis--in a historically significant building--is a grand undertaking with an even more profound impact. Capital and acquisition costs for this initiative are \$15 million. Establishing an endowment for \$5 million for future maintenance brings the **Restoring Hope** goal to \$20 million.

Support from Urban League family and friends toward this \$20 million goal would enable us to invest in our new facility and its future by providing:

- Renovated space for education, basic needs fulfillment, financial services, health care, events, and more
- Essential system upgrades, including HVAC, plumbing, and electric
- Safety improvements, including asbestos removal, security system, elevators, covered parking, and perimeter fencing
- Aesthetic enhancements, including flooring, lighting, and painting
- Solar paneling and new roofing for long-term energy savings
- Modernized administrative offices that streamline efforts and enhance connection to community
- Endowment funds to protect the future of the restored building
- Build-out of hydroponic farm, retail, food service and other commercial spaces
- Create a vibrant, thriving campus

Once renovated, the iconic Old Sears Building will again serve as the social, cultural, and civic center of the St. Louis African American community.
